Previous Department Goals & Results

- ❖ Goal 1: In support of the district's Lexile goals, labeling of books at the K-6 level will be 100% completed by August of 2014. At all appropriate levels, instruction will be given on searching for books at students' Lexile levels and creating Lexile resource lists.
 - ❖ Completed within the timeframe; continually updated as new books arrive.
- ❖Goal 2: By the end of the 2014-15 school year, the Library Curriculum will be 100% aligned with the Missouri Learning Standards (MoLS).
 - Curriculum alignment completed in spring of 2015.
- ❖Goal 3: 100% of the Library Media Specialists will be trained on the Stripling research model by the spring of 2014.
 - ❖ All Library Media Specialists have been trained; this continues as new media specialists are hired.
- ❖Goal 4: 100% of the administrators will be trained on the Stripling model by the summer of 2014.
 - Training completed.

Department Goals

- ❖Goal 1: By the end of the 2017-2018 school year, the ratio of fiction books per student at the appropriate Lexile level will be 20 to 1.
- ❖Goal 2: By the end of the 2017-2018 school year, the ratio of non-fiction books per student at the appropriate Lexile level will be 10 to 1.
- ❖Goal 3: By the end of the 2017-2018 school year, the average age of the non-fiction collection will be 14 years old.
